Ida McCain: Uh, A few were at Morris College, they early, they ain't even in high school. And he finish college after that, Morris College 1929. And uh, after he finished uh, uh, well as I said he became the coach of Morris College when he finished that, then he coached about two years.

He came back to Morris College and he went to Temple and got his Master's degree, and he came back to Morris College and he was a fine Dean, no before that teacher training after his, because his degree was education and after that he was assigned to Dean, Dean at the college for several years.

And in the meantime he did a lot of civil rights work. For instance, he was uh, he Vice President of NACP in Sumter, SC. All the rest of the people were very careful. Like the public people, they were afraid to join the NACP and let it be known. It's so responsibility they would let them go. But they couldn't touch him because he was in the private school.
